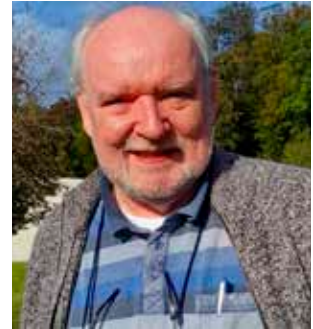
Your support is helping traumatised families to try to piece their lives back together.

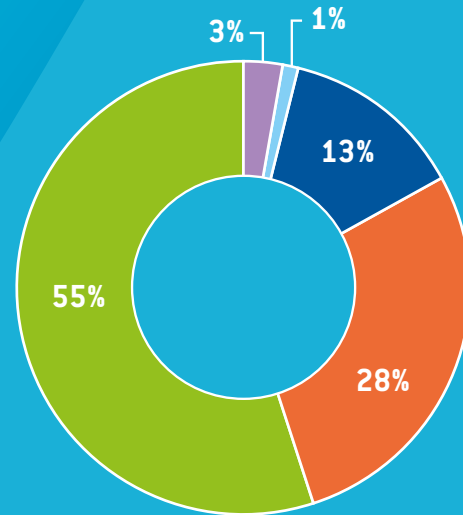

FUNDING

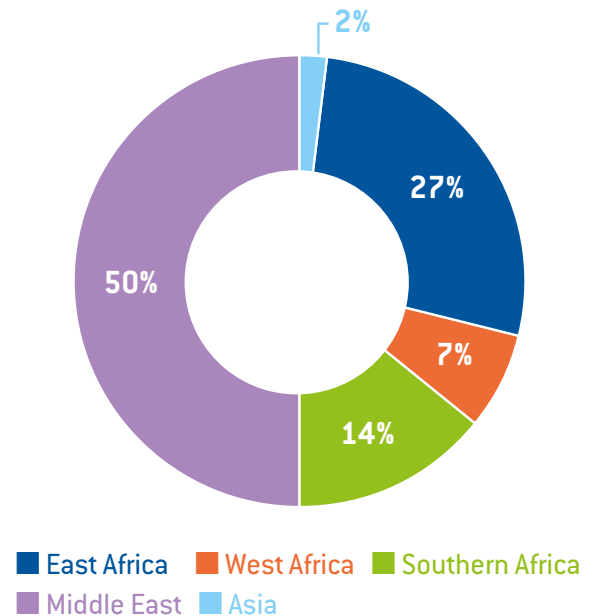
In 2023, we allocated a total of €1,827,437 in funding through the International Development Programme for various development projects and pastoral initiatives overseas.

EDUCATION

Objective: Provide quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities

Education is the key to a better future. Thanks to your generosity, 47,405 vulnerable persons across Africa and the Middle East have received access to quality education programmes at nursery, primary, secondary, vocational level and teacher training.

With your ongoing support, 1,000 girls in Nigeria were provided with educational assistance, uniforms, learning materials, school supplies and reusable menstrual hygiene products. In South Sudan 4,137 boys and girls received quality education over the last year.

Empowering Vulnerable Children in Jbeil, Lebanon

Your support has provided vulnerable Syrian children in Jbeil in Lebanon, receive early-childhood education, mental health and psychosocial support.

Impact:

- safe space and quality education for 992 children
- 90% of 4–5-year-olds improved skills through language and homework assistance

Moe*, a 10-year-old boy, is one of the many children who had to flee Syria to Lebanon for safety. Not only having suffered trauma in Syria, but life in Lebanon has also been particularly difficult. He has to overcome many obstacles since arriving in Lebanon, including leaving school in order to work full time at a supermarket and coffee shop to support his family.

He is now in the program you are supporting. With your help, a social worker has been able to support Moe and his family in order for Moe to return to his schooling. The support he receives at the afterschool club gives Moe hope of a better future.

Moe aspires to be a police officer in order to “defend society from criminals and fight corruption.” He wants to finish his education in Lebanon and return to Syria if the security situation improves to the point where it was before the war. He dreams of the day he can return to his homeland with his family.

IMPACT – BECAUSE OF YOUR SUPPORT

Central African Republic

- 30 female pre-school teachers trained
- 120 (84 m, 36 f) primary school teachers trained in safeguarding including referral system, monitoring, reporting and case management

Kenya

- Construction started at Aquiline Tarimo School
- 30 (12 m, 18 f) nursery children received day care in renovated classrooms
- 33 (17 m, 16 f) refugee secondary school teachers upskilled in Kakuma Refugee Camp
- 392 (294 m, 98 f) teachers and staff trained in child safeguarding in Kakuma
- 67% of students in 7 secondary schools secured quality grades in national assessments which grants them entry in higher education
- 72% of students in 7 secondary schools benefitted from child safeguarding awareness

- 13 children supported with primary education, medical support, counselling and school feeding in Kangemi
- 1,876 (994 m, 882 f) pupils provided with latrines and water tank at New Kihumbuni Primary School in Kangemi slum
- 1,638 (835 m, 803 f) pupils provided with water tank at Kangemi Primary School
- 4,000 children and youth in Rumbek learned their rights to education and protection

Lebanon

- 12 (9 m, 3 f) children supported in access to school and transport in Beirut and Tripoli
- 40 stateless children sensitised on legal rights
- 60% of girls and boys completed kindergarten 3 level and integrated into the public school system
- 2 teachers trained on pedagogical and improved their teaching skills

- 693 (309 m, 384 f) vocational students attended Solar & Electrics, Construction, Masonry, ICT, and Tailoring courses at LSS Wau and St Peter Claver Ecology & Computer Centre (SPCECC) in Rumbek

- 164 (79 m, 85 f) students supported at pre-school in St Teresa Parish, Rumbek
- 65 (40 m, 25 f) in-service students trained at Mazzolari Teacher Training College (MTTC) in Cueibet
- 171 (112 m, 59 f) students taught at Victor Luke Odhiambo Secondary School, Cueibet
- 365 (177 m, 188 f) children enrolled in St Justina Primary School, Cueibet
- 3 classrooms and a borehole constructed at St Peter Faber Primary School, Akol Jal
- 3 vocational classrooms constructed at Loyola Secondary School, Wau

- 4 males trained in Climate-smart Bamboo Construction
- 8 men trained in Bamboo Panel Fabrication training

Uganda

PROTECTION

Objective: Improve protection of those most vulnerable within our care and surrounding communities

We committed to responding to humanitarian emergencies and protection of the excluded in Kenya, Malawi, South Sudan, Syria and Zambia.

Your support provided emergency relief including life-saving food, water, hygiene kits, and health services for children and families affected by the conflict in Sudan.

Your response to the floods in South Sudan, enabled students and teachers in Maban receive school materials that had been washed away during the floods.

Your commitment to children with acute additional needs helped provide children at Upendo in Kenya's largest slum, Kangemi, with trauma counselling, psychosocial support, feeding and education support until they were ready for integration into the mainstream primary school.

Rebecca and a group of 31 people arrived in Renk after a 7-day journey from Sudan, traveling by foot and bus. They fled Sudan when civil war broke out.



Rebecca and Martha's Journey to Safety

Rebecca (30) and Martha (65), like so many others, fled Sudan when civil war broke out, leaving the lives they once lived behind.

They fled to Renk, a border crossing in South Sudan, travelling mainly by foot and one bus. It took them 7 days to arrive at the camp and they travelled with a total of 31 people (6 men, 8 women and 16 children – the youngest being 9 months old).

They left Sudan because of the shootings and bombings, which left them with little choice. Leaving their home town, Bahari, they had to cross a bridge that had been occupied and guarded by the military. They had to wait until the military and fighting had moved before they could pass over the bridge, fearing for their lives.

On the way to Renk they saw fighting almost everywhere, they suffered hunger and thirst but knew they had to keep travelling south to avoid the violence.

Both women express how lucky there were to escape but in Renk they understand there are new challenges to face. In Renk – overcrowding and insecurity, especially for women and girls, is a frightening concern. Access to water and food, especially for the babies and children they travelled with, is a daily struggle.

The need for humanitarian aid is literally a life-or-death situation. Rebecca and Martha wish a better life for their children to live somewhere where they can be in peace, go to school and have a safe life.

Thanks to your generosity, we have been able to continue supporting Rebecca and Martha, with counselling and physiotherapy, food (beans, cooking oil, sorghum flour and sugar), soap, kitchen utensils, plates and cups.

- 39 (27 m, 12 f) staff trained in Project Cycle Management in the Jesuit East African Province
- 209 (95 m, 114 f) children received psychosocial support, feeding and education at Upendo

South Sudan

- 109 (77 m, 32 f) students and teachers in Maban supported with books, pens, and stationaries lost during the flood and the school fence replaced
- 240 (74 m, 166 f) provided with relief food, clothes, tarpaulin, soap, mats and sanitary pads in Maban during floods
- 204 (102 m, 42 f) adults provided psychosocial support and Psychological First Aid (PFA) in Maban
- 536 (256 m, 271 f) children supported with group mental health and psychosocial support services through child friendly spaces

- 419 (215 m, 271 f) supported with physical rehabilitation services
- 83 (31 m, 52 f) people with protection needs and 4 (2 m, 2 f) unaccompanied or separated children referred to protection help desks

Syria

- 130 (74 m, 56 f) students supported at the library in Alberto Hurtado SJ Centre in Damascus
- 2,134 youth supported in cultural and art workshops
- Film festival, concerts, language classes, and art exhibitions held at Alberto Hurtado SJ Centre providing a safe space for socialization to the local community

Zambia

- 4 workshops held on safeguarding reaching 200 participants
- 142 (67 m, 75 f) youth trained in social justice, advocacy, and engagement strategies in Mumbwa District
- Advocacy initiatives for access to quality education, health, and water conducted by the trained youth
- Meetings organized to have dialogue with duty bearers on various social justice issues reached 11 duty beares including Mubwa District Council Local Authority

HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

Objective: Promote good health and well-being

Promoting the health and wellbeing for people at all ages is essential to sustainable development. Significant efforts are needed to fully eradicate a wide range of diseases and address many different persistent and emerging health issues.

Your support has responded to the physical and psychosocial health of communities of refugees and low-income vulnerable people across 7 countries - China, Ethiopia, Kenya, Lebanon, Malawi, South Sudan and Syria.

Rebuilding Hope following Syria's Earthquake

In February, a 7.8 degree magnitude earthquake struck Syria, affecting tens of thousands in Homs, Al-Kafroun, Damascus and Aleppo. The people of Syria have suffered so much already. Life for so many families has been extremely tough, with the war, huge destruction, the lack of electricity and fuel to warm houses during the freezing winter.

Your support has provided:

- Emergency food baskets to 11,079 households in Aleppo, Homs, and Damascus
- 2,290 vulnerable households with winter clothing and hygiene kits

- 8,714 people with Psychological First Aid
- 1,869 people with Mental Health and Psychosocial Support
- 1,905 people with healthcare
- 540 patients with life-saving and life-enhancing surgeries
- 2,000 vulnerable children with winter coats

All this life-saving work couldn't be possible without your kind generosity. The call to be men and women for others is inspiring!

China

- 14,987 (2,987 m, 12,000 f) leprosy patients and people with HIV supported at Casa Ricci Social Services in China

Lebanon

- 71 vulnerable families received food boxes
- 28 chronically ill persons provided with medicine

Kenya

- 100 pupils (37 m, 63 f) supported with psychosocial support in Kangemi Primary School
- 733 (399 m, 334 f) students provided with hygiene kits at 2 schools in Kangemi

South Sudan

- 683 (312 m, 371 f) received Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) and Rehabilitation Service at Renk Transit Center

- 880 refugees provided with tarpaulin and mosquito nets for protection
- 150 women provided with sanitary pads
- 33 (17 m, 16 f) staff trained in Psychological First Aid
- 5,000 litre water tanks installed at 5 schools in South Sudan
- 19 goats and 33 chickens provided to mothers in Rumbek enabling them to feed their children goats' milk and eggs during dry season when harvests are exhausted

Malawi

- 3 boreholes damaged by Cyclone Freddy repaired in Chiradzulu District providing 2,115 (865 m, 1,250 f) access to clean water
- 4,869 (1,949 m, 2,920 f) people in 3 villages provided access to a borehole drilled in Phaloma District
- 4,012 (1,019 m, 2,993 f) cyclone survivors supported with psychosocial and community post-trauma healing

- 350 households provided with water buckets
- 1,575 (654 m, 921 f) people raised awareness on Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene
- 280 women and girls provided with dignity packs including sanitary pads
- 350 households provided with relief food, buckets, blankets and soap
- 200 (88 m, 112 f) children provided with learning materials
- 225 households provided seeds, harvesting vegetables from their garden, enhancing food security and nutrition
- 60 (41 m, 19 f) faith leaders trained in psychosocial and mental health

CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME

Our work focused on promoting sustainable farming and supporting smallholder farmers and female heads of households in preparedness to reduce their risk to shocks and stresses, including environmental disasters, climate change and violent conflict.

In 2023, we continued to champion gender, with our focus on female headed households on many of the farms and trainings we supported in Malawi, South Sudan, the Philippines and Zambia.

Thank you for the gift of water!

Understanding the fundamental link between water, forests, biodiversity and agro-biodiversity is critical. This is why, as well as tackling lack of access to clean and safe water, you are improving community water and sanitation systems in communities in the Philippines. Because of your donations, water tubs were constructed at APC Mindagulos School and local forests were regenerated in order to protect those water sources.

Our partner, Apu Palamguwac Cultural Education Centre (APC) is supporting indigenous culture, language, and the relationship with the land as the basis for educating children in Upper Pulangi in Mindanao.

The Pulangi River is where the Pulangiyēn people draw their identity and many villages in Upper Pulangi have been limited in accessing safe water. The involvement of community members in the construction of the water tubs has also fostered better relationships within the Mindagulos community and as well as enabling upskilling, construction work provided marginalised workers with income.

Water is something that is often taken for granted on this side of the globe but for the Pulangiyēn people your support has saved and improved the lives of their families and loved ones.

- 211 households improved nutrition and water security through clean and safe water interventions
- 500 households provided with energy efficient cook stoves
- 100 households increased their annual income
- 7,192 (2,647 m, 4,545 f) teachers, learners, and farmers sensitized to child protection

South Sudan

- 95 (66 m, 29 f) youth led the Go Green climate change program in Rumbek
- 206 farmers trained in crop production in Akol Jal, Cueicok, Abarkou, and Malual Bab
- 151 households improved nutrition in Rumbek

- 119 households increased income from the sale of crops in Rumbek

WORKING WITH OUR JESUIT SCHOOLS IN IRELAND

Jesuit School Teacher Placement Initiative

Last year, Ursula McCague, a teacher from Gonzaga College, volunteered with the World of Work (WOW) program in Kenya, which empowers street youth aged 18-24 with life skills, education, and housing. Led by Tim Flynn and a local team, the program includes sessions on financial literacy and health awareness. Ursula's role focused on developing computer and organizational skills, as well as teaching chess, which was a great success.

The Jesuit School Teacher Placement Initiative provides tailored professional assignments for personnel from Irish Jesuit schools to work with overseas partners, addressing real-time needs in a cost-effective way.

Jesuit Student Engagement Initiative

This youth focused initiative promotes social justice, challenging young people to understand how the way we live in Ireland impacts on those most vulnerable in the global south. As well as looking at issues regarding our environment and common home, it is also an opportunity to learn about geo-politics and the development work of IJI and the sector in general.

Here are some examples of engagement:

- Seminars and talks on climate justice linked to our Malawian emergency relief projects in the aftermath of Cyclone Freddy as well as talks on the green school initiatives which are empowering Malawian youth to be proactive in caring for trees and local wildlife.
- Global citizenship education sessions and teaching resources for Jesuit schools on water scarcity and the need to protect our waterways.
- A world map mural was painted by 4 TY students from Gonzaga. The map depicts all the IJI project areas across the globe and follows 'peter's map' - presenting countries in their true proportion to one another.

School Twinning

Belvedere has led the way in our initiative to build individual relationships with Jesuit schools overseas. Belvedere college is currently twinning with Loyola Secondary School in Wau, South Sudan and as well as supporting them on the construction of a vocational centre classroom block, the school community has also generously fundraised for the LSS feeding programme which supports vulnerable students from food insecure homes with meals at school.

Appeals

We were delighted to see Irish Jesuit Schools support us once again in our Lenten water appeal which fundraised for school water tanks, emergency hygiene kits and access to clean and safe water for communities in Kenya, South Sudan, Ethiopia, Syria and the Philippines.
